Strategic Plan 2008 – 2010

The Tribal Council met in December to review and refine our strategic plan. Here's a summary:

- Obtain federal recognition
- Protect sacred sites
- Protect treaty rights

- Preserve the Dakota language
- Preserve the Dakota traditions

We've broken this down into a 3-year action plan. The entire plan is available at the office. Here are some of our key goals for 2008:

- Create infrastructure, including policies and procedures, to sustain the organization in the areas of tribal membership, personnel, finance, governance, and fundraising
- Hire an Executive Director, who will then hire a Volunteer Director and a . Program Director - this could be the same person to fill both positions
- Recruit members for the various Tribal Council committees: Fundraising, Land, Membership, Policy, Pow Wow and Federal Recognition
- Create and monitor a twelve month work plan for each Tribal Council committee
- Land Committee and Executive Director will begin to identify potential new sites for the Tribal Office - current lease expires September 2009

2007 Accomplishments

We were very busy in 2007. Here's a short list of all we accomplished in 2007:

- Held our 8th annual Traditional Pow-wow. Attendance exceeded 1,500 participants, representing a 300% increase since our first pow-wow in 1999. We had 10 traditional drum groups participate, which is almost unheard of for a traditional pow-wow. We registered over 30 dancers in traditional regalia and had many unregistered dancers participate. Our volunteers donated over 300 hours of time & talent to make this event a success.
- Initiated the establishment of a charter school, Wakanyezapi (Sacred Little Ones), which will focus on the Dakota culture and language as part of its overall curriculum. We will continue to pursue this into 2008 and beyond.
- Hosted the Oceti Sakowin (Seven Council Fires) meetings. The first of such traditional council meetings in over 100 years to be held. These meetings are held to discuss issues pertinent to all Dakota people.
- Held weekly Dakota Language classes open to the public and free of charge. Had an average of 10 attendees at each class. Brought in elders fluent in the Dakota language to share their knowledge. Provided audiotapes of elders speaking fluent Dakota as a teaching tool.
- Held monthly Dakota Culture classes open to the public and free of charge, where we had an average of 20 attendees at each class. These classes covered Dakota history, traditional ceremonies, and shared traditional stories.
- Awarded scholarship to community volunteer to assist them in pursuing their Dakota Language education.
- Protected 1805 treaty rights (pass & re-pass rights at Camp Coldwater) through appropriate legal challenges.
- We participated in Mendota Day's community celebration, Earth Vigils in Washington DC, and Moon Dances in Mexico.

Fundraising Committee

We fulfilled our obligation according to the terms of the Otto Bremer grant, by hiring Pam Zeller to help us reach our goal of having a paid executive director and administrative assistant.

We hope to hold our wild game feed in April at St. Peters Church. We are still working on the details. If you are interested in helping plan this event, please contact the office and leave your name and phone number.

The Symposium on Dakota Sacred Places and Cultural Renewal on April 4-5 will bring together elders and others who have worked to preserve sacred spaces against great odds, to examine and recount their history and begin to map the way toward cultural restoration.

- Hosted Native American speakers (and even some authors): Faith Bad Moccasin, Chris Leith, Ed McGee, Barbara Marshak, and Angela Wilson to name a few.
- Participated on the National Trust of Historic Preservation Twin Cities Local Advisory Committee.
- Partnered with Great River Greening and the Pilot Knob Preservation Association on a prairie restoration project at Pilot Knob.
- Participated in an EAW for the Dan Patch Trail housing development to protect possible burial mounds in Savage, MN.
- Promoted the Dakota culture through educational outreach with the University of St. Thomas Students for Justice and Peace and the University of St. Thomas English department students.
- And many more events and activities that we don't have room to list.



HECUA Partners Internship Program has approved a grant for us to hire a student intern in the summer of 2008. This intern will be involved in recording history of the MMDC as part of the federal recognition process. They will interview MMDC members and Dakota elders from other communities regarding the history of the Dakota in Mendota.
