For the past 24 years, the Mendota Mdewakanton Dakota Tribal Community (MMDTC) has tried to honor our ancestors by re-uniting the Dakota people. To help them understand not only where we have come from, but where we are going and why. We continue to inform and challenge our members to get involved in order to meet our mission. Our mission is to preserve, protect, and promote our Dakota culture for future generations.

In June 2020 we will be celebrating 25 years as the formally organized community, the Mendota Mdewakanton Dakota Tribal Community. We are the Descendants of a band of Mdewakanton Sioux Indians of Minnesota, who have resided in Mendota since the 1880's and before.

Our family's and ancestors have lived in Mendota since before history was being written.

The Mendota Community are the Traditional Guardians of the Eastern Gate.

In order to continue our mission, we need additional demographic information from our members.

This information will help us identify potential areas of need, as well as potential resources to help us

achieve our mission.

Over the past 24 years we have spent many thousands of volunteer hours fighting for the preservation of sites sacred to the Dakota people. We have brought Dakota ceremonies, language, Page 6 of 8

and culture back to the birthplace of the Mendota Dakota Nation. Mendota is not a reservation as far as the BIA believes. The Mendota community feels we are a reservation. Our family's elders have told us for years that we are a reservation.

Mendota and other Dakota people believe Pike Island is the center of the earth.

We have visited schools and cultural organizations throughout the Twin Cities area to educate our neighbors about the true story of the Mendota and other Dakota People in Minnesota to promote acceptance and healing between our people and the general public.

Dakota people have been so traumatized over what has happened to their ancestors. Even today Native people are traumatized.

We brought together once again the scattered descendants of the Mdewakanton band of Dakota people who once thrived in the Mendota area. We have bridged the gap between Indian and non-Indian communities. Our commitment to sustaining Dakota language and culture is our organizations driving force. Our programs and events are open to the public. We encourage all people to learn and participate in our activities. We collaborated with tribal communities, cities, counties, state governments, and also grass-root organizations on issues and initiatives that pertain to and affect Dakota and other Native peoples.

Consistent with our mission, our programs and our activities, focus on the preservation of Dakota heritage, culture, our descendants.

Here are some examples of our past accomplishments and projects:

- Mendota has Initiated and hosted the annual remembrance ceremony for 22 years to honor the Dakota ancestors, who were interred in the Fort Snelling concentration camp after the 1862 Dakota Conflict.
- Starting our biweekly Dakota language classes free of charge and open to the public.
- Starting our biweekly monthly traditional craft classes free of charge and open to the public.
- Starting our biweekly monthly Cultural Class.
- How to make our traditional frybread with a group of 10 people or more. Watch for emails or look on our website for more details.
- We have participating in an annual traditional Sugar Bush Camp from time to time.
- Exercising Treaty rights, such as pass and re-pass rights at Camp Coldwater and fishing rights under the 1805 Treaty.
- Partnering with the Pilot Knob Preservation Association to protect a historical site from being developed into a commercial office-building complex. Promotion initiatives also provide the foundation for improved relationships with our non-Dakota relatives.
- Educational Outreach to local schools to share the Dakota culture, crafts, regalia, and artifacts.
- Maintaining a website for the MMDTC providing historical and cultural information to visitors we work collaboratively with tribal, city, county and state governments, Native and non-Native

non-profits, and grass root organizations on issues and initiatives that pertain to and affect Dakota and other Native peoples.

- Working with the Preserve Camp Coldwater Coalition to protect a site that is sacred to Dakota people and of cultural significance to the people of Minnesota.
- Partnering with the Pilot Knob Preservation Association to protect an historical site from being developed into a commercial office-building complex.
- Collaborating with the University of Minnesota on several native-related projects.
- Teaming up with the City of Mendota and the Mendota VFW in organizing the Mendota Days community celebration.
- Working with both the MNHS and MDHS to help us get the truth told about our Mendota history.
- Collaborating with (Friends of the Sibley Site).
- The MNHS lets us use the Dupuis House for our meetings.
- The Dupuis House is the ancestral home of many Mendota families.
- Work with the Ospaye (a.k.a. Friends of the Friendly), a group of people ineligible to be MMDTC members who are dedicated to supporting MMDTC and its efforts.
- We will continue to fight for our Treaty Rights with the Federal Government.
- Collaborating with St. Thomas College, we will have students helping us do research for our history and federal recognition for the bureau of federal acknowledgement.

We are here to play an important spiritual and cultural role for all people who live in this land of our ancestors. Please help us to continue. Pidamaya! (Thank you)
